#### **MEMORANDUM**

SUBJECT: 2018-2019 30th Annual Essay and Slogan Contest

For the past 29 years, the Office of the Secretary of State has held a statewide Essay and Slogan Contest for Kentucky students. The discourse this contest stimulates among students is all the more important in light of waning voter participation in the youngest demographics. The contest is an excellent way to garner recognition for your students, and it helps them become involved and familiar with government and democracy.

Students in grades 6-8 are invited to participate in the voter slogan contest, and students in grades 9-12 are encouraged to take part in the essay portion of the contest. I encourage you to distribute the web address listed below and use this project in your classes or with individual students to generate cross-curriculum writing ideas.

Prizes will be awarded for first, second, and third places in the slogan contest. In the essay contest, a first-place prize will be awarded for each high school grade level. In addition, a \$500 prize will be awarded to the school that has the highest participation rate.

The monetary awards for contest winners are made possible by contributions from KEA and KEA Retired, the Scripps Howard Center for Civic Engagement at Northern Kentucky University, the University of Kentucky Scripps Howard First Amendment Center, the Kentucky Department of Education, Kids Voting Kentucky, and Harp Enterprises. The Scripps Howard Center for Civic Engagement at NKU and Kids Voting Kentucky also will judge the essay portion of the contest. I am grateful to our partners for their generous sponsorships of this program.

## Essay Contest Rules and Prompt 30<sup>th</sup> Annual Essay and Slogan Contest Secretary of State Alison Lundergan Grimes

- 1. The Essay Contest is open to all Kentucky high school students in grades 9-12.
- 2. Essay entry is limited to one per student. Previous contest entries will not be accepted.
- 3. Essay may be no longer than 600 words. All entries must be typed and double-spaced.
- 4. Student and school names shall not appear anywhere in the body of the essay.
- 5. Essays will be judged on research and understanding of voting and the First Amendment, idea development, organization, language, and correctness (see attached rubric).
- 6. Students must submit their essays with the enclosed entry form. All sections of the entry form must be completed.
- 7. Essays may be submitted either online at www.sos.ky.gov/contests or by mail to the address below. Essays submitted online must be in Microsoft Word format.
- 8. All entries must be submitted electronically by 5 p.m. (EST) December 21, 2018, or postmarked by that date.
- 9. Entries become the property of the Kentucky Secretary of State's Office and will not be returned.
- 10. All guidelines must be met for any entry to be considered by contest judges.

### **Essay Prompt:**

When an American citizen turns 18, he or she has the right to vote. Yet in recent years, America's youngest voters are also America's least frequent voters. Turnout among young voters has been consistently and significantly lower than for any other age group. Youth turnout (ages 18 to 30) was 28 percentage points lower than persons age 60 and older in 2016 and nearly 39 points lower in 2014. Is the current climate of divisive discourse part the explanation for young voters' disinterest? Or does the explanation lie elsewhere since vibrant and even contentious public discourse is expected in America given the First Amendment's protection of free speech?
